

IN THE HISTORY OF COFFEE


An exciting affair that revolves around a family and coffee and is rife with encounters, battles and passions.

A dense, rich story like the blending of a coffee.








AT THE COFFEE MERCHANT'S SHOP

COUNT NERO GASTONE OF BELLAGIO




n 1756 Alfredo left for Europe with a shipment of coffee, but he was imprisoned

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
